The cliché 'practice makes perfect' holds true for just about everything, including writing your own music. Having a steady rhythm, especially when you make your own beat is important, and this can be achieved through practice. There are a lot of tutorials online that can teach you basic music theory and how different time signatures and tempos help create different moods. You can also look for an online metronome to help you practice your beats and keep in time.
